What is Self-Direction: Transcript

Self-direction is a model of long-term care that allows people to receive support in their home the way they want it, even people who might otherwise live in a nursing home or group home. Let's take, for example, Betty who needs 24/7 support, including help bathing and getting dressed. Then there's Michael, who needs support with job skills and getting rides to community events. With self-direction, people like Betty and Michael recruit, hire, and manage their own workers. That means Betty can hire her daughter to help her with intimate tasks like showering. And when Michael has a last-minute job interview, he simply asks his worker to drive him there and updates his schedule accordingly. They can also buy things to help them live more independently at home, like grab bars in Betty's bathroom or a computer for Michael to connect with his peers. Self-direction programs have supports built in to help people set goals, make decisions about how to meet their needs and manage payroll and paperwork. People who self-direct can also appoint a family member or friend to help manage their services and make decisions on their behalf. Across the country self-direction gives millions of people more choice, control, and flexibility so they can live safely and comfortably at home and remain part of their communities.
