Other Successes

Nearly **1,000** adults have attended Paving the Way training sessions to date.

700 of these adults were parents and family members of children with developmental disabilities. The remaining 300 were professionals and allies.

600 Children have been reached through Self-Advocacy Story Time

32% of participants report being from rural areas (slightly higher than anticipated.
